Tlingit Verb Rummy Card Game

Rules:

- 1. Each player is given 7 cards to start. Other cards go in draw pile.
- 2. Play begins with first player drawing a card. Player then tries to make a sentence using at least two cards (except in the case of an "I" verb, which can be used alone if it makes sense by itself). The longer the sentence, the more points it is worth. If the verb in the sentence is third person singular (he or she), a "person" card must be used as well.
- 3. If the player can make a sentence, she puts the cards down, says the Tlingit sentence aloud, and gives the English translation.
- 4. At the end of the player's turn, she must discard one card face up in the discard pile.
- 5. Player #2 can draw from the draw pile or the discard pile. As in rummy, any player can take as many cards from the discard pile as they wish, but must take all the ones on top of the one they want. The cards picked up in this manner do NOT have to be played during this turn.
- 6. Play goes on until one player runs out of cards. At that time, score is determined by adding up all the points of the cards that the players have used in sentences (positive points) and subtracting those still in the hands of those who didn't go out. The person who went out first gets a 20-point bonus.
- 7. More rounds can be played if desired, either with a running score, or starting over each time. This game can be continued from one class to the next, playing one round each day.
- 8. As more nouns & verbs are learned by the class, the cards in the deck can be changed.

Point values:

Noun cards – 5 points Verb cards – 10 points Other cards (and, today, now, also) – 5 points NOTES ON CONSTRUCTING THIS GAME: Enlarge the font to about 28—that makes the words big enough to read when they are in the discard pile, yet they still fit on a 4 x 2.25 inch playing card. This list has about 136 items—too many to play with at one time. The teacher can choose which verbs and nouns to use each time the game is played. At the end of this word list is an alphabetized list of the same words, with English translations included. Encourage students to use the "cheat sheet" if they don't know what some of their cards mean.
